This table has been designed as a quick reference guide for making informed decisions about the various control methods available, and for considering the pros and cons of each. The information in the table indicates the qualities of each control method and what they can be expected to achieve when the methods are used correctly, the operator is experienced and/or trained, and the correct equipment is used.
